

NORTHERN INDIANA SPOONPLUGGER

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The last meeting was held May 20, 2013 at the Kendallville Public Library with 16 members and guests present.

President Denny reported that northern pike are beginning to become active for the season. Pike season can usually be determined as being in full swing in the Midwest at the same time the cottonwood trees are loosing their "cotton" (which gathers on our lines when trolling and drives everyone crazy!)

Most lakes are still pretty clear, however, algae blooms should be firing up before long with the warmer temperature returning following a relatively cold spring. Lake temperatures are presently 67-70 degrees in most area lakes

Denny also reported that with the warmer temperatures, there is little need for using 3-way rigs on the troll. Trolling Spoonplugs by themselves will do the trick. In addition, Denny reported a 49 inch muskie was recently caught on a local lake.

Bluegills were reported beginning their spawn on many lakes....mostly the smaller lakes since the larger lakes take extra time to warm up but by the time you read this, they will probably be all done in the smaller lakes and well underway in the larger ones.

There was also discussion on lakes that have northerns and walleyes also seem to have BIG bluegills as well. Perhaps the predatory nature of the northerns and walleyes keep the competition down among the

prey fish, thereby leaving the bluegill that don't become breakfast or lunch get to grow large enough to avoid predation. That's pure speculation on my part, but, that's my story and I'm sticking with it!

John Bales gave a report on a recent fishing trip to Lake St Clair. 6 guys in three boats were able to boat 588 smallmouth up to 6 lbs during the 3-day outing. There were also a few walleye and a couple of very nice muskies caught. John bemoaned the fact that fishing the St Clair, Detroit River, and Lake Erie complex has one very important drawback: Fishing this area will spoil you to the point that coming home and fishing area lakes can be disappointing for several days afterwards. It's really is that good!

I just received an email from John Zaborny announcing the Leoni Outing in Jackson, Michigan June 18-24, 2013. If you've never been to this outing, it is well attended and always one of the best of the season. John and TJ always have first-class accommodations for everyone attending. Good fishing on lakes close to the site and you are only an hour away from the premier fishery of Detroit River/Lake Erie. In fact, You don't even have to leave the compound in order to fish as there is a well stocked pond right in the front yard! If you are interested in good fishing as well as a good time, this is the outing for you!

BUCK SEZ:

"My lake has a bottom completely covered with muck, moss or short grass. I can't work my lures on the bottom. What do you suggest?"

As we stated earlier, if you **can't** work the bottom, then you have to **work as close as you can.** This may present problems, but we can regulate our lure size and line length (on cast or troll) so that the lure "barely" skips the debris. If our gear is correct, most of the muck and grass can be "jerked" free, but the moss may be another story.

Many times we have been faced with a lake bottom such as yours. We have found we can regulate depth on the troll by lure size and line length. On the cast, we may have to go to a weedless type lure, but even here the muck and moss can foul it.

We normally work a lake of this nature first by trolling as close to the debris as possible so as to not be **continually** fouled. But all the time we're looking for a clean spot or a hard spot. Most every lake of this nature will have some clean or hard spots. They may be few and far between, but they will exist. Our lures must tell us what type of bottom exists, or we would never find the areas we are looking for. We must find the more workable bottoms, for **that will be where the fish are.** Fish do not like to be on muck or soft bottoms, if the clean spot (break) is available. All of this means we get fouled quite a lot. But most of them can be quickly cleaned by a hard jerk or jerks, with the stiff rod and non-stretch line—with no time lost. The clean or hard bottom presents no problem on the cast.

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"Some place back in the study you said to look for the deep water 'first', and then look for the structure in relationship to this deep water. Then in this study you tell us to check the 'shallows first', before going deeper. This seems to be a contradiction."

I believe if you go back and restudy what we said previously (under Structure, Breaks and Breaklines) you will find we were talking about **interpreting** a fishing situation, or **when studying a contour map.** The **first thing you do is locate the deep water**; then look for any structure in the area. It would be rather a waste of time to spend time looking for good structure on a contour map, and then find out there was no deep water in the area.

In this study of Presentation, we are talking about an entirely different thing. We're talking about what area do we "fish" first.
