

Lake Michigan Report

Chris Angsten went out one day in December on Lake Michigan out of Milwaukee. Chris got on the water at 10:00 AM. North of the harbor in 40' to 60' there were many small humps that were probably made from dumping hard materials such as clay and rock etc. Many guys were trolling in the 40' to 50' range. Most of them were trolling their lures no deeper than 20' and most were gone by noon. Chris started trolling in the 50' range working the humps with one line on the bottom, one at 20', and another at 35'. He was looking for the old water intake and discharge structures because he thought they might be bigger. As soon as he found the first structure he hit a nice lake trout at 20'and that was it. It took a while but he found another good spot in 61' quite a ways from the first. It was a bigger hump and topped off at 49'. He caught two more Lakers and a good sized Brown Trout all on bottom working lines. One of the Lakers was big and shook the hook at the net. The harbor should be good in January and February for brown trout. You can still catch Lakers near the gaps. The Lakers are out of season all winter so you'll have to release them but it sure beats the heck out of ice fishing. When the Browns are going it's easy for one guy to catch 50 browns a day so give Lake Michigan a try in the winter!


